REPOA's Annual Research Workshop is Tanzania's largest and longest running research workshop. Initially conceived as a research capacitybuilding workshop, this event has gradually grown to include policy dialogue, and draw in a wide circle of intellectuals. All participants value this opportunity for knowledge sharing and networking. In its desire to

Therefore, REPOA will compile and publish the presentations and discussions on growth and development from this and the previous two years' Annual Research Workshops. This will strengthen further the linkage between our workshops and policy makers and the intellectual community.

Excellencies, ladies and gentlemen,

This year REPOA has begun the fourth strategic plan, 2010 to 2014, which will guide this organisation through its second decade of operation. The preceding strategic plan was characterised by the rapid expansion

and diversification of operations, which resulted from an increased demand for services in knowledge creation and facilitation. These challenges continue to provide a positive stimulus to the development of a dynamic organisation. Valuable insights from external reviews, and stakeholders, have helped shape the strategic direction for the next phase. Therefore, this fourth strategic plan sets out the framework for a period of consolidation, a time to reflect and concentrate our efforts in areas we consider REPOA can make the most effective contribution to development in Tanzania.

Excellencies, ladies and gentlemen,

Building the capacity of researchers continues to be the major area of focus for REPOA, and continues to be an important component of the Annual Research Workshop. Therefore, in addition to the papers presented in the plenary session, twenty one research papers will be presented and discussed. These papers provide a vital platform for researchers to present their work, receive constructive feedback from peers, and valuable advice on areas which require revision. Workshop participants are requested to appreciate the differing levels of expertise of our researchers and support them fully in this capacity building initiative. Excellencies, ladies and gentlemen,

In closing, I would like to pay tribute to those who provide financial and moral support to REPOA to conduct its activities in the areas of research, capacity building, fostering dialogue, and responding to stakeholders' needs. The Chairperson has mentioned and thanked the REPOA basket fund contributors. Their generous funding is vital to Tanzania's development in the field of research. I would also like to acknowledge, with gratitude, the active support provided by other key stakeholders; development partners from other nations, academics and academic institutions, researchers and other research organisations, members of civil society organisations, and the media. We welcome support from those development partners who have not yet joined our basket funding arrangement.

Right Honourable Prime Minister, I am proud to report that, REPOA is one of the few organisations outside the public sector receiving financial support from the Government of Tanzania; for this we are most grateful. We understand that the fourth phase Government has pledged to support research much more vigorously than before. It is my sincere hope that

due to the central role REPOA plays in policy dialogue and development, the level of financial support to REPOA will continue to grow.
